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### LRPC Executive Board Meeting Minutes of April 12, 2023

#### 1. Call to Order

Chair Ayer welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order at 9:02 AM. It was announced that Vice Chair David Katz and Dean Anson were attending remotely. An in-person quorum was established.

#### 2. Minutes

Minutes of March's Executive Board meeting were acknowledged for comments and discussion. Cristina Ashjian requested a couple of changes be made regarding her roundtable contribution which were noted. Following this, Bob Snelling made a motion to accept the minutes with modifications which was seconded by Secretary Farley. A voice vote was taken in which all members present were in favor and a roll call vote was taken from Vice Chair Katz and Dean Anson, both signifying their assent. Motion passed.

#### 3. Finance/Treasurer Report

Executive Director Hayes stated that we have recovered quite a bit from our deficit of the past couple of months; however, we may fall back again for the next month or two due to the timing in billing of some quarterly contracts. We are expected to break even by the end of the fiscal year. It was also stated that our contract with Lakes Region Computers will be increasing significantly due to strengthening cyber security measures. We also have plans to switch to a .gov domain name for added security.

#### 4. Monthly Executive Report (March)

Executive Director Hayes provided a brief review of this report. There were some questions and discussions on various items.

### 5. Committee Reports (TAC)

Executive Director Hayes went over the ranking process for the TYP projects and explained why it was amended from the initial ranking to the recommendation submitted to the DOT.

There was discussion regarding how to improve TAC membership participation. A suggestion was made to initiate a survey whereby members could submit topics they would like further information on and to possibly schedule more presentations. Additional discussion ensued regarding attendance implications similar to that of the Commissioners whereby a letter is sent out notifying the Board of Selectmen after 3 consecutive unexcused absences.

Bill Bolton made a motion to amend the TAC Standing Rules & Procedures to include sending a notification letter to towns when a member has 3 consecutive unexcused absences which was seconded by Secretary Farley. A voice vote

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was taken in which all members present were in favor and a roll call vote was taken from Vice Chair Katz and Dean Anson, both signifying their assent. Motion passed. It was also decided that a letter should go out to all TAC members advising them of this change.

Treasurer Kerr noted that the newly appointed Chair of the TAC is accelerating his retirement such that April was both his first and last meeting. He also commented on how electric vehicles seem to be the current hot topic and most of April's meeting was regarding same, especially concerning charging stations and costs.

#### Old Business

- a. <u>Resignations/Open Board Positions</u>. Executive Director Hayes reminded members that Chair Ayer is permitted to appoint temporary replacements through the next election. It was decided that this needs further discussion, so no action was taken at this time.
- b. <u>By-Law Changes</u>. Executive Director Hayes advised that the proposed changes have to do with clarifications, the most important of which is clarifying that the nominating committee is responsible for nominating officers to the Executive Board and that those nominations shall come from the Executive Board membership. After discussion, the suggested verbiage was refined slightly, and Cristina Ashjian offered a motion that we accept the changes as discussed which was seconded by Secretary Farley. A voice vote was taken in which all members present were in favor and a roll call vote was taken from Vice Chair Katz and Dean Anson, both signifying their assent. Motion passed.
- c. TYP Submission to DOT. This was addressed as part of #5 above.
- d. <u>Annual Meeting Updates</u>. Executive Director Hayes provided an update noting that our keynote speakers will include a panel consisting of participants from Revision Energy and Clean Energy NH. The venue this year will be Mills Falls at Church Landing. He also mentioned that a request for nominations for our 3 award categories went out this week.
- e. <u>Potential Adoption Vote of RHNA Report</u>. A discussion was had regarding whether we are ready to recommend to the full commission to adopt the RHNA report as drafted. Executive Director Hayes is not certain we want to actually recommend an adoption and a question was raised as to adopting versus accepting and the implications of each. It was decided that we should recommend *acceptance* rather than *adoption* and further discussion should be had at the next Commissioner meeting in this regard.
- f. <u>Membership Logo Design</u>. After a brief discussion, Chair Ayer announced that he is withdrawing his recommendation to implement this idea.

#### 7. New Business

a. <u>Draft FY24 Budget</u>. Executive Director Hayes went over this in detail. There was some discussion in a couple of areas, but overall everyone was satisfied. Bob Snelling made a motion to recommend the budget be presented to the full commission for vote at its first meeting after the Annual Meeting (which will be September 2023). This motion was seconded by Mark Hildebrand. A voice vote was taken in which all members present were in favor and a roll call vote was taken from Vice Chair Katz and Dean Anson, both signifying their assent. Motion passed.

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#### 8. Roundtable

C. Ashjian, Moultonborough—Moultonborough is heading into its Town Meeting. They have had their first budget and warrant hearings. The selectboard had a meeting wherein they have decided not to put *The HUB* community center proposal on the Town warrant, but it will go in as a petition warrant article. Several offices are contested this year and a candidate's night has been scheduled. The Zoning Board granted a special exception application regarding the bulk fuel facility proposal on Route 25.

M. Hildebrand, Center Harbor—Moultonborough has approved a smaller version of the town line development. There will now be 21 buildings with 2 units each. Resident abutters have already appealed it. There will be a selectmen's meeting in a couple of weeks on this and Cristine Ashjian advises it is also on the agenda for Moultonborough's next ZBA meeting.

P. Farley, Tamworth—There was an economic development meeting last night and they are making further plans for two forums: 1) how to pass local property on to children or others and 2) to provide an update on the previous broadband forum. The selectmen have decided to install an electric charging station in the center of town. Additionally, Pat advises that an Economic Development Commission board member is willing to donate land to establish a community garden.

B. Bolton, Plymouth—Bill is the Executive Director of Transport Central – a local non-profit transportation service – and mentions that PSU is looking to take advantage of approximately \$11 million in earmark money to purchase electric transportation vehicles, charging stations, and install solar arrays. Several years ago, Transport Central had a regional bus service map made which included the North Country Council as well as the Lakes Region. Bill is able to secure additional money through the North Country Council and Tri-County CAP to be used for planning and implementation.

D. Anson, Laconia—The Belknap County Conservation Commission manages the state-owned land across from the old State School property which is being used for community gardens and they are willing to assist any other municipalities that may be interested in setting one up. He indicates that Sycamore Community Garden in Concord is also a good resource in these regards. Dean reminds us that the Conservation Commission is working on three projects concerning run off issues from Black Brook Road in Sanbornton, Deer Park Association in Meredith, and Gale Avenue in Laconia utilizing 319 grant funds with each town putting in a 40% match. FB Environmental recently completed their evaluation of the Langley Brook watershed and they will be making a public presentation to the Conservation Commission on May 17<sup>th</sup>. Finally, it is noted that the cancer support organization Gilda's Club has changed their name to Lakes Region Cancer Support Team and it is located at the Busiel Mill.

D. Katz, New Hampton—All warrants passed at the town meeting. Of note was the approval of continued funding of their RSMS, approval of the ZBA's updated flood plain ordinance, and approval of a heritage fund to further the preservation of their Town House.

R. Snelling, Holderness—They had their town meeting, nothing significant to report.

D. Kerr, Barnstead—The voters approved the purchase of a \$1 million ladder and pumper truck at their town meeting. There was a very well attended and contentious Planning Board meeting regarding an Air BnB site plan application

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
and the applicant's unawareness of a homeowners' association. There is also a long-standing subdivision application which has finally been resolved by approving it as a major subdivision with 3 lots.

J. Ayer, Gilford—Their short term rental ordinance was approved a couple of weeks ago and it will go into effect on July 1st. They have already received 2 or 3 applications, but still need to determine the requirements and fees. John recently attended the 2023 National Planning Conference in Philadelphia where parking requirements was a significant topic.

Chair Ayer adjourned the meeting at 11:33 AM.



# **Community Service Award- Kate Thompson**

The words "exceptional" and "sustained" only touch upon the myriad and decades-long contributions that Kate Thompson has given to the community of Tamworth. She is a neighbor, philanthropist, artist, conservationist, and entrepreneur whose interests are found in the selfless promotion of a thriving and caring community. She is a tireless, passionate, and caring friend. Many have dubbed her the "Unofficial Mayor of Tamworth", and for good reason. In the interest of brevity, we will offer just a few highlights of her many accomplishments.

# The Other Store

For many decades, Katy has been the owner and operator of The Other Store, the community hub of Tamworth Village. Beginning in the late 1990s, this store was a unique combination of café, candy shop, gift shop, and hardware store. Its unique, eclectic, artistic nature drew the attention and coverage of *Yankee Magazine*.

As a café, it offered breakfast and lunch, as well as, in summer, ice cream treats and dinner for Barnstormers Theatre patrons. It was filled with gift cards, office supplies, local farm products, and it featured local artists and crafts people. As a hardware store, it meant locals had no need to drive out of town for nuts and bolts, light bulbs, batteries, cleaning supplies, or Benjamin Moore paint. The store provided employment for retired residents, the disadvantaged, and the advantaged. This was the place generations of Tamworth teens had their first job. Kate's summer music concert series, offered to all by voluntary donations, was always a grand success. This was truly a country store with just about everything for anyone.

Today, in its latest iteration, The Other Store has become "The Other Bakery," where the tradition of community service continues.

# The Barnstormers Theatre

Kate has been on the Board of The Barnstormers Theatre for many years, including as Chair. She helped facilitate its major renovation. Every year, she helps organize the painting of Barnstormer play posters for mounting on the Theatre, calling on local artists. As an artist, she has painted numerous Barnstormer posters herself, including a famous one for a Theatre favorite, *Toad of Toad Hall*. Kate owns and runs a guest house for the Theatre's actors and crew during the summer season. (The Gillman House; in winter, it provides workforce housing).

Kate's constant presence and attention to the Theatre assures that the front steps are painted, that young ushers guide each patron, and that the Theatre will continue its long, historic place in Tamworth as the oldest, continuously running summer stock theater in the state.

# The History Center (THC), from a fellow Board member:

A founding member of THC, Kate Thompson holds the history of Tamworth both in her head and in her heart. At every meeting, she tells stories of our past. In the many years that our collection has been shared via free-standing banners all over town, she knows where things belong and can put on an exhibition that interests us all. She's held many positions on the Board, currently co-president. From whatever position, she

is the one with the ideas, the energy, and the connections to get things done. As one Board member recently put it, Katy's quiet nudge is what it takes to get volunteers to show up to do whatever needs doing.

After having a limited home for its collection for several years, with Katy's drive the THC bought the "Hall Dyer House" on Main Street in 2008. Ever since, Katy has been there helping us get the grants to renovate the 1830 building and to find the contractors. Her involvement was one of the anchors that helped persuade the Tamworth Foundation to fund a new, part-time Executive Director position for the THC and to establish an endowment that will continue to support that position.

Katy has also worked tirelessly to preserve several other older buildings in town. She is bringing the old Moulton house back to life in South Tamworth. She also maintains the Larrabee Barn on Route 25 for THC storage and, over the past two years, has donated space there for Bearcamp Bikes, which repairs and gives away bicycles to anyone in need. She helped keep the Old South Tamworth post office from becoming extinct. There are other examples. Our town has a much deeper sense of its past due to Katy's energy and care.

# And her contributions continue:

As an artist- painter of the signboards of the village, theater paintings, store signs, Tamworth Outing Club dance posters, and even silhouette drawings of many children.

As a conservationist- Katy has long been a local leader in land conservation, participating on the Tamworth Conservation Commission's Conservation Lands Review Committee since its inception in the late 2000s. In this role, she has helped identify local land conservation priorities, helped with landowner relationships, and donated leverage funding, artwork, and editing to ensure the success of several projects critical in the "Whites to Ossipees" wildlife corridor preservation effort. The preservation of large forest tracts in the northwest part of the Ossipee Mountains (where she lives) has been guided, in large part, by her influence.

As a compassionate friend- donating to causes of all kinds and working creatively with children of all ages.

To put it simply: Tamworth would not be the community it is if Katy Thompson was not here, paying attention, creating, and making things happen. Her dedication, service, and effective leadership are widely recognized throughout the community.

Hi All,

Below is the proposed fair share language that Ben Frost and I worked on, to be included at the very beginning of each RHNA and accompanying the fair share table of each RHNA.

<u>Please review and let me know if this language suffices or if you have suggested changes no later than COB this Friday,</u> May 5, 2023.

This Regional Housing Needs Assessment and associated fair share table in Appendix X (or on page X) does not break out the current municipal fair share of regional need and therefore shouldn't be relied on for current compliance with the state's Workforce Housing Law, RSA 674:58 – 61. The purpose of this assessment is to show what level of housing production is estimated to be needed for a municipality to meet the law's requirements at the end of the planning period. For a municipality to demonstrate that its existing housing stock supplies its current fair share of regional need for workforce housing would require an analysis at the municipal level undertaken separately from this assessment. Specifically, RSA 674:59, III states, "A municipality's existing housing stock shall be taken into consideration in determining its compliance with this section. If a municipality's existing housing stock is sufficient to accommodate its fair share of the current and reasonably foreseeable regional need for such housing, the municipality shall be deemed to be in compliance with this subdivision and RSA 672:1, III-e".

RE: Household Hazardous Waste Collection Events 2024-2026

Dear Mr. Jeffers:

Tradebe Environmental Services has enjoyed servicing the Lakes Region Planning Commission and its member communities over the last four years. During this period, we took on the daunting task of managing four HHW collection events on two consecutive weekends. Shortly thereafter, we were faced with the added challenge of doing this during the first pandemic in over a century.

Through this, Tradebe has gained an understanding of the events' requirements, their benefits, and their limitations. We have observed the challenges that arise from running such an intense operation and their impact on our teams and infrastructure. As a result, we thought it may be beneficial to provide the LRPC with this unsolicited offer regarding the continuation of our contract, which is set to expire following the 2023 season.

During this continuation, Tradebe suggests moving to a more spread-out event schedule:

- 2 events in June after Memorial Day
- 2 events on the last weekend in July
- 2 events on the first weekend in August
- 2 events in September a week or so after Labor Day (to provide a final opportunity before Columbus Day)

We are proposing this change for several reasons detailed below.

First is a reduction in participation. We are seeing a consistent downward trend in HHW participation overall, but this is especially pronounced in the LRPC events. By spreading out the events, we will create more opportunities for the residents to attend. This slump in participation is also likely related to weather. Last summer brought extreme heat which almost certainly hampered participation. Spreading the event dates will also help with this issue.

The second reason for the change is a reduction in volumes. In addition to fewer participants, there is also less waste per vehicle. Moving to a spread-out schedule may open the door to people moving more waste out when not distracted by the lakes.

Third is staffing Issues. Because we are at a 98% utilization rate for our staffing, we are stretched thin for contingencies. Under the current model, this means that there are few reserve workers should there be any illness or personal emergencies due to running four events simultaneously. By limiting this to two events rather than four, we will have extra staffing available to cover unforeseen absences. Another personnel issue we're considering is heat stress. This year we had several people experience mild to moderate heat impacts. By operating two sites per weekend, we will be able to overstaff during the mid-summer events to compensate for the impacts of higher participation at single locations and prevent heat stroke from being a safety issue.

Finally, this change addresses increased per diem costs. With the cost per room nearing \$200 per night in Concord, running fewer events per weekend means using local staff more often and less out-of-state staff. Under



the current model, we need to bring in employees from CT, NY, and other nearby offices to manage the concurrent events.

Should you have any questions upon reviewing this unsolicited proposal, we would be happy to address them and work through any potential concerns. Tradebe has enjoyed working with the Commission and hopes we can continue this relationship to our mutual benefit.

# A. Proposed Pricing

The pricing for the events under this new contract would be as follows:

Price per year: \$140,000

Number of events per year: 8

Extrapolated Price per event: \$17,500

This pricing includes all disposal, supplies, personnel, mobilization, and fees for the events in question.

#### B. COMPANY BACKGROUND

Tradebe Environmental Services, LLC (Tradebe) is a privately held and diversified waste management company that has been engaged in the collection, treatment, recycling, and disposal of hazardous and non-hazardous waste for over 35 years.

Tradebe's US operations own and operate 9 RCRA permitted Part B treatment, storage, and disposal facilities. Tradebe owns and operates a nonhazardous industrial landfill, an oil recovery facility, a nonhazardous wastewater treatment facility, and nonhazardous bulking and processing facilities. Tradebe also has 17 ten-day transfer facilities that are staffed with highly trained, experienced, and degreed Chemists who can provide lab pack and high hazard services. Tradebe also maintains a fleet of fully permitted waste hauling vehicles operating out of both our TSDF and transfer locations for your transportation needs.


# C. EVENT DESCRIPTION

Tradebe will furnish all the labor, packing, transportation and disposal needs required by the Lakes Region under the requirements and Scope of Work requested in the RFP. Tradebe's trained chemists and lab pack technicians will be present during the HHW collection day to fulfill all of the segregating and packing duties. Tradebe's Account Manager will work with the Lakes Region personnel to develop final plans for this event. As requested in the RFP, for regulatory purposes, Tradebe will assume generator status for the collected HHW and will be responsible for waste from the time of collection until the waste is properly disposed of at our facility. Tradebe already has the necessary permits and licenses to fulfill this purpose. Tradebe will work with the Lakes Region to compile an agreed-upon HHW schedule. On the day of the HHW event, Tradebe will secure and remove all material by the end of the day.

Tradebe understands that the Lakes Region will provide the following services for the HHW collection event:

- Security for the site;
- Control of traffic;
- Screening of participants;
- Stand-by fire, medical, and hazmat emergency crews;
- Comfort facilities for all on-site workers:
- Non-hazardous site clean-up, which shall include a roll-off for disposal.
- Advertising for the event





# C.1 SCREENING, RECEIVING & OFF-LOADING PARTICIPANTS

Tradebe will work to safely and efficiently unload the participants' vehicles in a friendly and professional manner. Tradebe's on-site personnel will have a clear understanding of hazardous chemicals and will be able to answer questions from residents.

As the vehicle pulls into the unloading lane, the participant will be asked to put their car in the park position and remain in the vehicle. The unloader(s) will inspect the load for any leaking containers or unacceptable material and notify the customer if any are found. If any potentially dangerous items (i.e. explosive, radioactive, and biohazardous) are discovered, a chemist will be called over to inspect the material and determine the best course of action.

The unloader(s) will then carefully remove all acceptable material and place it on a plastic cart. If a waste item is determined to be too heavy or large for the unloading cart, the unloader(s) will request that a drum cart or forklift be used to transport the waste item to the appropriate workstation. The chemist will segregate and help pack waste that is collected. Any lab pack material (items requiring special attention) will be packed by a qualified chemist.

Tradebe will ask that the participant identify any unlabeled material found in the vehicle. This information will immediately be written on the container with a permanent marker. If it cannot be identified, the material will be taken to the screening area for analysis.

# C.2 ON-SITE BULKING

Tradebe will be able to bulk on-site used oils, antifreeze, and flammable liquids into 55-gallon drums. A bulking station will be set up away from the receiving area where cars will be coming through. The bulking stations will



be set up on spill pads and will be grounded to avoid any static electricity sparks from generating. A spill response kit containing a shovel and Oil-Dry will be on hand in case of any accidental spill. Based on our experience at hundreds of HHW events, bulking of oil-based paint in cans and latex paint in cans is counterproductive and not an efficient use of labor resources due to the non-pourable nature of most oil-based paint and latex paint in cans which are typically brought to HHW events.

# C.3 WASTE IDENTIFICATION/ PACKAGING

The collection site will be divided into several areas. A segregation station will be set up with tables covered with plastic. Empty waste containers will be arranged a few feet behind the segregation tables. Tradebe's fully trained field chemist will manage this workstation. Tradebe's chemists will examine the labels of the individual containers to determine the list of chemical constituents and their concentrations. From this information, the chemist will be able to determine the proper hazard class and packaging protocol for the waste item. If the chemist requires additional information, the waste item will be further analyzed through Tradebe's unknown testing procedures. Absorbent materials, such as oil dry, spill pads, and cotton rags will also be present on-site, in case of a spill. Most of the items received at the segregation table will be lab packed or loose packed.

All waste material that is unloaded at the segregation table will be placed in UN-rated/DOT approved containers. The field chemists will then pack the waste items according to Tradebe's Lab Pack Guidelines, which are based on DOT and EPA regulations. In some cases, Tradebe's guidelines are more stringent than DOT or EPA's regulations for packaging waste material. Once the drum is closed, the chemists will add the appropriate labels for shipment to Tradebe. These labels and markings include:

- Non-Regulated Waste Label
- DOT hazard class, as required
- Drum inventory sheet, if lab pack drum
- Tradebe waste stream number or lab pack number

All collected materials will be removed from the designated HHW site by the end of the day.

#### C.4 UNKNOWN IDENTIFICATION

Tradebe will assist the Lakes Region in identifying any unknowns they come across during their waste receiving process.

Tradebe's chemists will sample and test the waste materials utilizing Tradebe's Unknown Testing Procedures. From the field analysis, Tradebe's chemists should be able to determine hazard class and proper packaging protocol.

The procedures are only completed in the presence of other trained chemists for safety purposes. Chemists will don appropriate safety gear (which may include respirators) while performing the tests. Tradebe's Unknown Testing Procedures aid our qualified field personnel in the verification and subsequent acceptance of unknown materials encountered during on-site operations. Tradebe's field chemists can test for the following:

- Physical Appearance
- ▶ pH
- > Flammability
- Water Reactivity
- Cyanide
- Sulfides
- Peroxides



- Oxidizers
- Qualitative PCB Screen

Most of these procedures were instituted in the original lab-pack manual and have been used successfully without a safety-related incident over ten years (over 200,000 samples). These screening procedures, in whole or in part, may be used to provide insight into a material's chemical characteristics. Tradebe's field chemists can often identify the waste material without having to perform these unknown field tests. Less than 10% of all containers initially identified as "Unknown" are packaged and shipped as characterized unknowns. The field personnel use their knowledge of chemicals as well as information from the resident to identify the waste material.

#### C.5 LIST OF EQUIPMENT

# Other Additional Training/Training Information:

Tradebe maintains that the responsibility for a safe operation rests with all of its employees. Specific training is given to all responsible on-site supervisory personnel and the individuals handling, storing, and treating wastes. Off-site personnel participate in training programs to meet the requirements of 29 CFR 1910.120. Site design, operational procedures, and planning affect the operations; therefore, individuals involved in these functions must be aware of the criteria for safe and efficient operation. Emergency response training is conducted per 29 CFR 1910.120 and the Contingency Plan for each facility. This means that each employee, with a specific duty established in the Contingency Plan, will be fully trained as to the specifics of the duty or action required. This training includes drills or simulated emergencies to provide practice for personnel and to determine the adequacy and effectiveness of the Contingency Plan. Training for personnel also encompasses RCRA and DOT training. Each level of personnel is trained to meet or exceed federal, state, and company requirements.

Tradebe provides all of its Technical Field Service employees, which includes the Reactive Division, with a 40-hour initial HAZWOPER training course per OSHA 29 CFR 1910.120(e), before their assignment to a work area. The training is provided "in-house" by a Tradebe Certified Environmental Trainer. The personnel must also pass a DOT and OSHA/HAZWOPER physical examination and receive certification to wear a respirator, before working with hazardous materials. All personnel receive an annual physical as a part of Tradebe's medical monitoring program.

Tradebe's training program for Hazardous Materials Transportation personnel includes HM-126F Training, which addresses general awareness, function-specific, and safety training per DOT 49 CFR 172.704. Transportation personnel, at a minimum, are also provided 24-hour TSD facility HAZWOPER training per OSHA 29 CFR 1910.120(p). All 40-hour and 24-hour trained personnel also receive an eight-hour annual refresher training course. Refresher courses consist of relevant topics, including, but not limited to: Contingency Planning and Emergency Response, Decontamination, Waste Characterization, Hazardous Materials Handling, a Review of Current Federal Regulations, and Container Management.

All Field Chemists have obtained their Class B Commercial Driver's License (CDL) with Hazmat and Airbrake Endorsements. Also, the following courses are included in their training:





This location provides service to all of New Hampshire, Vermont, and Maine. This facility is a permitted transfer station for various types of hazardous waste and is a stabilization facility for non-hazardous solids (specialty wastes). These specialty wastes are incinerated for their thermal value to produce electricity for the state of Maine. Several transportation units and trained teams provide field service and spill response service to customers in the Northeast.

Tradebe Treatment and Recycling Northeast, LLC (Tradebe) operates several straight vacuum trucks, vacuum trailers, roll-off trucks and containers, a unibin truck and several field service vans. Drum customers are serviced using either a straight box truck or a box trailer. Various types of absorbents, spill booms, roll-off cans and vacuum boxes, as well as most types of field services equipment are also stored at this site.

The facility operates as a 10-day hazardous waste transfer facility, which allows for truck-to-truck transfers and shipping container changes which allows us to create a better economy of scale in our transportation services to other Tradebe facilities or third party disposal facilities.

Tradebe also operates a permitted solid waste mixing and solidification facility which allows us to mix many common non-hazardous waste sludges and solids, again creating economies of scale in both the disposal and transportation aspects of waste handling. Once stabilized, the wastes can be transported to either a waste to energy facility or to secured landfills depending on our client's preferences.

Tradebe processes used oils, oily water mixtures, oil/water separator liquids and sediments, machine coolants and tank bottoms. These mixtures are treated with both heat and chemicals to accelerate phase separation so that the used oils can be marketed as fuels and the water and sediments can be properly disposed of at other Tradebe or third party disposal facilities.

This facility is a part B permitted treatment, storage and disposal facility (TSDF) that handles various hazardous and non hazardous petroleum and aqueous products in a unique, indoor facility. The recovery and recycling of fuel grade materials is the primary purpose of a facility that successfully manages a wide range of industrial wastes. Cone-bottom tanks, designed by Tradebe, facilitate the separation and collection of fuels, aqueous waste streams and solids. Vent systems and vapor recovery equipment protect the air and collect light fuels that would otherwise be lost in the process. Containers are stored and processed in a facility that allows for easy management of materials. And, water is treated in the facility that was used by Environmental Protection Agency to develop pretreatment standards for our entire industry. The facility's fire protection is based on prevention, segregation and suppression. The design criteria anticipate emergencies and protect our personnel, our neighbors and the environment so small problems do not turn into big ones. The facility reduces liability by avoiding disposal of waste materials on site. The operation is completely contained in a coated concrete vault system that is also protected by a membrane. The flagship plant of company still holds to its original purpose. Products are recovered and made suitable for reuse and recycle. Residuals from this process are also managed with recovery in mind. Tradebe has been extending the life-cycle of industry's materials for over thirty years and



is a major force in enhancing the sustainability of manufacturing in the Northeast. The facility operates twenty-four hours per day, seven days per week. Incoming products are normally accepted between 7:00 AM and 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday. In the event of an emergency, around-the-clock analytical services and acceptance of product can be arranged. This facility is capable of handling an average of 75,000 gallons per day, seven days per week, with a total capacity of 260,000 gallons. This facility also holds a wastewater discharge permit and is capable of treating and discharging many types of industrial and other aqueous waste streams. This location houses our parts washer division. An on-site certified laboratory with research and development capabilities supports the company's analytical needs.

#### **Treatment Processes:**

Fuel Blending, Solid Distillation, Liquid Distillation, Hazardous Waste Stabilization, Non-Hazardous Waste processing and Solidification, Lab pack Consolidation

The Indiana facility sits on approximately 12 acres in a heavily industrial section of East Chicago and is approximately 20 miles south of downtown Chicago, Illinois. Tradebe's neighbors include a commercial gas manufacturer, a rail-yard, and a vacant aluminum smelting facility. The closest water stream is the Indiana Harbor Canal, which is approximately 2,700 feet west of the facility. The majority of the property is dedicated to serving Tradebe's waste management operations. Also located on the facility's property is a rail-line that accommodates up to ten rail cars.

EPA Region V and the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) originally issued the Part B RCRA permit in 1991. The facility currently has storage capacity for up to 4,508 "55-gallon drum equivalent" containers of hazardous waste. With the issuance of the renewed permit, permitted drum capacity increases to 11,000 drums. Tradebe's operation includes a 165,000-gallon tank farm, a newly redesigned state-of-the-art lab pack/depack facility, a drum consolidation, and handling building, and a non-hazardous processing building with 45,327 gallons of bulk treatment capacity. The company's laboratory and receiving area are capable of accepting and analyzing up to 2,000 drums per day. The Part B facility has the capability of receiving up to 30,000 drums per month. Tradebe recently acquired an adjacent 8-acre site, which serves as a transfer yard for incoming and outgoing waste and potential expansion of the East Chicago operations.

In July of 2004, Tradebe added a new capability to its range of services called the Solid Distillation System (SDS). The SDS allows Tradebe to process and recycle waste materials on-site. The process is unique because unlike other thermal processes, the material never contacts the heat source. It is baked rather than burned and the baking drives off volatile and semi-volatile organics that are reclaimed and recycled. IDEM has designated the SDS as a recycling process and therefore all materials it processes receive a Certificate of recycling. The SDS is capable of processing 123,000 drums annually and holding 88,000 gallons of liquid storage.

In the spring of 2015, Tradebe advanced our capabilities in solvent recycling commissioning the new SDS2 processing unit. The new unit also located in East Chicago has approximately twice the capacity of the original SDS unit. Both units are currently operational and will be operated concurrently. The SDS units will annually process 36,000+ tons of hazardous waste, reclaiming 7,000+ tons of scrap metal and producing 2.75 MM+ gallons of reusable solvents.

Wastes suitable for the SDS units include paints, resins, polymers, solvent-soaked rags, paint filters and other organic solvent containing debris.



Our Solid Distillation System is a self-contained, indirectly-heated, rotating processing chamber that uses an anaerobic atmosphere to remove volatile and semi-volatile organic compounds from solid waste. SDS eliminates oxidation and the formation of hazardous compounds. In addition to the environmentally friendly nature of the process, the SDS system offers many other advantages over typical direct-flame systems.

The SDS offers many advantages over the typical direct-flame systems:

- SDS can effectively process any solid waste containing organic compounds.
- SDS helps generators meet the Environmental Management Systems objectives.
- SDS prevents pollution while promoting recycling and reuse.

#### **Treatment Processes:**

Fuel Blending, Solid Distillation, Liquid Distillation, Hazardous Waste Stabilization, Non-Hazardous Waste processing and Solidification, Lab pack Consolidation

The Millington facility is regulated by the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) and the U.S. E.P.A. and is zoned for heavy industry. The TSD facility consists of 40,000 square feet of operations and is permitted to store up to 9,748 "55-gallon drum equivalents" on-site.

The Millington permit operational capacities allow this site to accept and process the same types and similar quantities of waste that are handled at the East Chicago, Indiana facility. The Millington facility operations include an 80,000-gallon tank farm and a stabilization process for hazardous wastes and a solidification process for non-hazardous wastes. In addition to the processing areas, the Millington facility features a well-equipped laboratory, receiving and loading docks, and buildings for indoor storage.

Tradebe continues to upgrade the Millington facility. A state-of-the-art laboratory has recently been added to further aid in the analysis and testing of waste samples, resulting in faster drum processing and quicker test results back to clients. Tradebe also recently completed the reconstruction and reconfiguration of its stabilization and non-hazardous processing area. Tradebe shall contain, control, and clean up any spills occurring during collection, packaging or storing HHW to protect the public health and environment. Our <u>Safety, Spill and Emergency Plan</u> is presented below.

### Safety, Spill, and Emergency Plan

If any chemicals are spilled while Tradebe is on-site, Tradebe's Technical Field Personnel will serve as the initial emergency responders. Tradebe's field personnel are fully trained on the proper procedures for responding to small chemical spills and fires. Tradebe will keep the following information at the worksite:

- Emergency Response Guidelines (Actions to be taken)
- Emergency Response Contacts and Telephone Numbers (Site Safety Plan)
- > A Map to the nearest medical facility

### **Emergency Equipment**

The following equipment will be available for an emergency response situation:

### Internal Communication and Alarm System

Telephones should be located on-site within easy access to all areas where an emergency may arise. The telephone will be used in an emergency to call 911 and to communicate with the appropriate outside agencies.

### Emergency Eye Wash

Emergency eyewash will be present on-site.

### First Aid Supplies

First aid kits will be available on-site.

### Fire Prevention System

Fire extinguishers will be present on-site and within easy access to all areas where an emergency may arise. All fire extinguishers are inspected regularly and recharged annually.

### Spill Kit

The spill kit will contain a broom, shovel, and absorbent material.

### **Emergency Response Guidelines**

Unplanned releases fall into two categories: either an <u>Incidental Release</u> or an <u>Emergency Response</u>. Tradebe personnel will respond to incidental releases, nuisance spills, or minor releases of hazardous substances where the substance can be absorbed, neutralized, or otherwise controlled at the time of release. Incidental releases are limited in quantity, exposure potential, and toxicity and do not present a significant safety or health risk to the personnel assigned to clean up the release.

Upon determining that the release is containable and controllable, the specified Tradebe Emergency Response Coordinator (ERC) will implement the following clean-up action plan. During clean-up procedures, all reasonable measures will be taken to ensure that the fires, explosions, and releases do not occur, recur, or spread to other



areas. A small spill includes drips and splashes that cover a small surface, an area less than one square foot with estimated volumes less than one (1) pint.

A moderate spill includes splashes that cover a surface area greater than one square foot and with estimated volumes of less than one-half (1/2) gallon of material.

The following procedures will be performed by the Emergency Response Coordinator (ERC) and other trained Tradebe personnel in the event of an <u>Incidental</u> release.

### 1. Small fire

- a. Stay upwind and out of low areas.
- b. Eliminate ignition sources
- c. Move the appropriate firefighting equipment to the area; extinguish the fire.
- d. Using a shovel, transfer the spent material to a lined drum (or equivalent container) and seal the container.
- e. Ensure that the recovered waste or contaminated material is properly stored in a container storage unit.
- f. Decontaminate the area, equipment, and personnel.

### 2. Chemical Spill

- a. Eliminate all ignition sources and secure the area.
- b. Don the proper personal protective equipment.
- c. Move unaffected chemicals out of the area, if no hazard is involved.
- d. Contain the spill to prevent the spill from spreading. Use Damming Diking and/or absorbent materials to stop the spread of the spilled materials.
- e. Absorb the spilled materials with absorbents, including Vermiculite, Ultrasorb, or spill pillows.
- f. Using a broom and shovel, transfer the spent material to a lined drum (or equivalent container) and seal the container.
- g. Ensure that the recovered waste or contaminated material is properly stored in a container in the storage unit.
- h. Decontaminate the area, equipment, and personnel.

### 3. Solvent or Oil Spills

- a. Eliminate all ignition sources and secure the area.
- b. Don the proper personal protective equipment.
- c. Move unaffected chemicals out of the area, if no hazard is involved.
- d. Contain the spill to prevent the spill from spreading. Use Damming Diking and/or absorbent materials to stop the spread of the spilled materials.
- e. Absorb the spilled materials with absorbents, including Vermiculite, Ultrasorb, or spill pillows.
- f. Using a broom and shovel, transfer the spent material to a lined drum (or equivalent container) and seal the container.
- g. Ensure that the recovered waste or contaminated material is properly stored in a container in the storage unit.
- h. Decontaminate the area, equipment, and personnel.

The Emergency Action Plan shall be implemented in the event of the following situation:

- 1. Fire
  - a. The fire could generate the release of toxic fumes.
  - b. The fire could spread and ignite materials at other locations.
  - c. The fire could spread off-site.
  - d. The use of fire suppressant materials could cause contaminated run-off.



- 2. Explosion
  - a. Imminent danger exists which could cause an explosion, resulting in extreme heat and gas generation.
  - b. Imminent danger exists which could ignite materials at other locations.
  - c. An explosion could occur which could release toxic fumes.
- 3. Unplanned Release of Hazardous Waste
  - a. The release of flammable liquids or vapors could create a potential fire or explosion hazard.
  - b. The release could contain toxic liquids and/or fumes.
  - c. The release has the potential to contaminant air, soil, or surface water.

In the event of an emergency requiring the implementation of the Emergency Action Plan, the Emergency Response Coordinator (ERC) assumes the lead role in responding to the emergency and will call the 911 emergency number and implement site control and evacuation, if necessary. This, of course, includes local police and fire department emergency response personnel.

### **Transportation Spill Guidelines**

In the event of an <u>on-the-road</u> spill or another emergency, the driver will follow these procedures:

- A. Remain in the unit and warn all pedestrians and motorists to stay away from the spill area. Point out to them the danger involved and have someone call the police or fire department.
- B. Upon the arrival of the police or fire department, the driver will inform them of what kind of material has been spilled and request the area be blocked off to both pedestrians and vehicles to prevent property damage or any serious personal injury. The driver will request the first responder, fire, or police personnel to protect the area while the driver reports to a facility Emergency Coordinator.
- C. The Emergency Coordinator will gather the following information from the driver and relay it to the National Response Center and the appropriate State agency
  - 1. Name of the person reporting the incident.
  - 2. Name, address, and identification number of the transporter.
  - 3. Phone number where person reporting can be reached.
  - 4. Date, time, and location of the incident.
  - 5. The extent of injuries, if any.
  - 6. Classification, name, and quantity of hazardous materials, wastes involved, if such information is available.
  - 7. Type of incident and nature of hazardous materials/wastes involved, if such information is available.
  - 8. For each waste product involved provide:
    - a. Name and identification number of generator.
    - b. Product shipping, hazardous class, and UN or NA number.
    - c. The estimated quantity of material spilled.
    - d. If possible, the extent of contamination to land, water, or air.
  - 9. Shipping name, hazard class, and identification of any other material carried.
- D. Specific actions to be taken at the scene of the spill are:
- 1. <u>Containment</u> the critical problem is to prevent the escape of any spilled liquid or solid into the ground or a storm or sanitary sewer. A barrier must be erected immediately to prevent the escape of spilled materials/waste liquids, using whatever material is at hand, even a dirt curb, to prevent the spread of the spill. Containment of



solids will be dependent on wind and weather conditions. Use the tarpaulin in the vehicle or plastic (available at most supply stores), if conditions are wet and windy. Simultaneously, the sources of the spill or leak must be located and controlled, e.g., a drum plugged or taped, turned upside down.

The possibility of evacuation should be considered in the event of a major spill (e.g., a collision with another vehicle or a loaded trailer that is turned over, with the subsequent container(s) rupturing). Major concerns involve ignitable wastes that may catch fire and possibly explode or generate toxic fumes. If fire threatens or occurs, personnel should be evacuated a distance of at least a half-mile as recommended by the Emergency Response Guidebook. If no fire threatens, and no container(s) has ruptured, a distance of 50 to 100 ft. should suffice.

If the shipping description is known (refer to the manifest) find the name in your Emergency Response Guidebook in the blue pages and turn to the Corresponding Guide Number (orange top page – last 1/3 of the book).

If the shipping description is not known, check the placard on the vehicle for an "UN" or "NA" number, look up the number in the yellow pages and refer to the Corresponding Guide Number, or contact the generator of the waste for safety data.

2. <u>Cleanup</u> - with containment affected and the spillage source controlled, cleanup is the next step. If the spill is contained on an impervious paved surface, the material should be absorbed onto a compatible material (e.g., sand, diatomaceous earth). Any commercial absorbent inert materials may be used, but make sure they are compatible with the waste and will not cause a reaction. If the spillage has reached earth, all contaminated dirt should be collected into drums or bags for disposal at an EPA approved site.

If any spilled waste has reached the ground, the contaminated soil will be removed. The extent of contamination will be determined by sampling the spill area. A qualified laboratory will analyze the sample. Sampling techniques, chain-of-custody requirements, and analytical methods will follow approved procedures such as those outlined in SW-846. Any soil exhibiting contamination above the local background level will be removed to an appropriate permitted disposal site.

### **EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT:**

Each tractor carries the following emergency equipment stored in the sturdy aluminum box:

- Gloves
- Goggles
- Slicker Suit
- Hazorb (4 pillows)
- Shovel
- Full-face Respirator
- Boots
- DOT Emergency response Guidebook
- Skin & Eye Neutralization Solution
- Emergency Reflective Triangles (3)

### Each Tractor Also Carries:

- First Aid Kit
- Flares
- Ten (10)-pound ABC Fire Extinguisher

Two steps remain once the immediate emergency aspects of a spill have been taken care of:



**Decontamination** – a truck or trailer exposed to a leak or spill will be decontaminated at the site to prevent any further release to the extent that it can be transported (or move under its power) to an authorized facility capable of further decontamination if necessary.

Equipment will be decontaminated in the following manner:

Each item used will be placed in an open head container and thoroughly rinsed with a compatible solvent or cleaning compound. The residue or wash water will then be drained into a tight head container, sealed, and disposed of per Federal and State Regulations at an authorized disposal site.

**Clothing** – Contaminated clothing will be placed with the cleanup residue and disposed of per Federal and State Regulations at an authorized disposal site. If clothing is reusable, then it will be decontaminated properly and the residue added to the other waste.

**Notification** – The Department of Transportation, Director of Hazardous Materials Registration, Materials and Transportation Bureau, Washington, DC 10590 will be notified, in writing, of the occurrence and nature of the incident and a copy will be submitted to the proper Environmental Management Facility.

### **Site Safety Plans**

Tradebe will prepare a site-specific Safety Plan for the HHW Event. Tradebe will ensure the on-site employees are familiar with the approved Safety Plan.

### NH HHW Coordinator Meeting November 22, 2022

Present: Sarah Silk, Lakes Region Household Hazardous Products Facility; Dean Robinson, NH DES; Jill Longval, Rockingham Planning Commission; Emma Rearik, Nashua Regional Planning Commission; Julie Ashton, NH DES; Tim Prospert, NH DES; and Dave Jeffers, Lakes Region Planning Commission

This was a virtual meeting from 1:00 to about 2:00 pm. The purpose was to re-establish meetings and update each other on this year's HHW collections and talk about possible trainings for HHW Coordinators.

### **Introductions and Summary of 2022 HHW Collections:**

Dave Jeffers said this year, they had 1600-1800 vehicles at a cost of about \$100,000. They use Tradebe and have been for several years with a fixed cost which helps the towns in budgeting. They have four sites each on two mornings a year. Tradebe may renegotiate the contract for a new pricing arrangement and expressed the difficulty in providing about 30 personnel to work these simultaneous collections. They only accept from residents within their region with no SQGs or schools. There is a 10-gallon limit per household.

Sarah Silk said they have a three-year contract with Clean Harbors who has provided impeccable services in the past. This year they raised the cost beyond the contract so Sarah was pretty clear they would not pay beyond the contract amount. There are six collections in Wolfeboro and two satellite collections in Alton. They have a budget of around \$98,000/year. They have a HHW shed so they can retain partially full drums to fill at the next collection. They pay by the container for what they send. There is a limit of 10 gallons per household though if people bring more, they "pull another ticket." Sarah added that they take from SQGs and schools as well as residents from outside their district.

Jill Longval said she had been at the Nashua RPC for several years operating their HHW program and storage facility using Veolia. She now works at the Rockingham RPC which only has one event a year and no storage, so it is much simpler. They use Tradebe, but Tradebe told them they are unable to provide a collection next year. RPC will have to go out to bid for next year.

Emma Rearik said the Nashua site still uses Veolia. Emma was there for this year's collections and said the six events brought about 2-300 households each plus there is one satellite collection each year which draws much less. Volumes have been increasing. They pay a flat fee of \$23,000/event.

Vickie Davis explained the UVLSRPC had five collections this year plus one satellite collection in the small town of Piermont which maybe 30 cars come from Piermont and Orford. They pay \$30 for each "unit" of 20 pounds or 5 gallons plus set up costs. This year 999 households participated at a cost of about \$94,000. The cost per household went up substantially. The hauler attributed this to increasing waste quantities.

There was some discussion about taking universal wastes or not. It seemed that taking them at a HHW collection was not cost effective if town transfer stations are already taking these materials.

### **Trainings:**

Vickie asked the group what trainings might be helpful as she has a USDA grant to provide trainings to the NH HHW Coordinators. Possibilities include:

RFP Writing Bomb Squad Inspection of a permanent storage building Universal Waste Educational outreach

"Gifts" of HHW to transfer stations and identification for management
Batteries (electric bikes), emerging technologies such as solar panels which can contain heavy metals
School chemistry

SQGs

These trainings will probably take place in the fall of next year. Any further thoughts about trainings/virtual workshops are welcome.

### Other:

Dean Robinson announced that as of July 2023, he will no longer be the program coordinator of the HHW program at the NH DES. The program will be moved from Pollution Prevention to Hazardous Waste Compliance. Tim Prospert will cover the position until a permanent replacement for Dean is found.

The next HHW Coordinator meeting will be in February/March.

**Development of Regional Impact** 

Location: Ragged Mountain Road, Danbury, Andover, and Hill towns Tax Lots: Maps 411, 415, 416, Various Lots; Total Area: 1876.34 acres

The Lakes Region Planning Commission provides these comments as part of the Development of Regional Impact process, under RSA 36:54-:58 for the Danbury Planning Board's review of the Ragged Mountain Cluster Residential Development Updated Master Plan (2023). The original plan had a maximum of 890 residential units as part of a cluster residential community around the existing recreational facilities.

According to the updated plan, over the next 15 years the applicant proposes to develop a phased development of 231-343 dwelling units and improvements to the ski resort, including an additional 140,000 square feet of ski lodges, a 52-unit condominium hotel, and an additional 3,000 square feet of event facilities. The open space plan proposes to create approximately 310 acres of common open space on the "Green Crow" parcel on the western side of the ski resort and about the same amount on the eastern side.

### **Development of Regional Impact Factors**

Several factors that define potential regional impact, according to RSA 36:55, should be considered as the Planning Board reviews Ragged Mountain Updated Master Plan, including transportation networks that provide access to the site; impact of the proposed buildings and number of dwelling units; impact on surface or groundwater; impact on conservation lands; impact on regional economy; and impact on emergency response.

### 1. Transportation Network

Traffic Generation: Will the development cause an increase in traffic that will diminish the capacity or safety of the road system in the adjacent municipality or potentially affect regional traffic patterns?

The developer plans to work with Danbury to repair and improve Ragged Mountain Road and associated stormwater management facilities. Traffic studies should be conducted prior to new phases of development. New developments are likely to cause significant increase to AADT. AADT is currently 157 on Ragged Mountain Rd. The proposed increase of up to 73 housing units in the next

five years could almost triple the traffic flow on a small local collector road. The intersection of Ragged Mountain Rd with NH 104 has poor geometry for the potential increase in usage. The potential shuttle service may save on parking spaces but would have minimum impact on trip generation. New Canada Rd should be paved to allow alternative access into the resort for residents as well as emergency vehicles. The developer will also be paying an Enhanced Building Permit Fee for Ragged Mountain's fair and proportionate share of the Town's transportation infrastructure costs resulting from the project.

### 2. Impact of the Proposed Buildings and Number of Dwelling Units

Will proposed buildings or number of dwelling units impact neighborhoods or areas in a neighboring municipality?

According to the Census 2016-2020 5-year estimates, there are 682 total dwelling units in Danbury. The 15-year build-out would increase the total units by 50%. It is unknown, if and how many homes will be occupied as permanent year-round housing. Most of the homes are expected to be used as vacation homes with the option of short-term rentals. Even so, the large number of additional residential units will increase traffic, the demand for goods and services, emergency services, and the need for potable water and sanitary facilities.

### 3. Impact on Surface or Groundwater

Will the development occur on or adjacent to known aquifers or surface waters that transcend municipal boundaries? Does the project involve permitting a large groundwater withdrawal? Will the development cause negative impacts to another municipality's municipal water supply? The plan does not state the amount of water, potable and non-potable, that will be needed to serve the 15-year build-out. The development will be served by either small community or individual wells and on-site septic systems. (Note: Section 10.16 of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions states that "Each lot is served by the community wastewater system. No owner shall construct a wastewater disposal system on a Lot." This contradicts previous statement that each phase will be served by septic systems, as the developer is financially unable to construct a large-scale community wastewater system.) To protect recharge, impervious coverage should be kept to a minimum. The plan states that stormwater management systems will be designed to maintain drainage flows at pre-development rates.

### 4. Impact on Conservation Lands

Does the development abut existing conservation lands or existing farmland such that coordination between municipalities could lead to the creation or preservation of greenways, wildlife habitat areas or prevent fragmentation of forests, farms, or other conservation lands?

To date, the development has preserved 100.23 acres of common open space. The original Master Plan states that for each dwelling unit 1.72 acres of land is to be dedicated open space for a total of 1,529.53 acres. The plan states that the use of the open space will be restricted in order to be retained "forever (predominantly) in its open, undeveloped condition" and "to prevent any significant impairment or interference with the property's natural, scenic, open space, wildlife and wetlands values." However, the plan also states that uses and improvements may include outdoor recreational activities including ski lifts, hospitality services, snowmaking ponds and facilities, community drinking water systems, stormwater management systems, and wastewater systems. The developer also reserves the right to include within or remove open space areas, for the "development of services and improvements accessory to the operation of the Resort, such as onmountain skier services, limited food services, outdoor chapel and other outdoor event facilities. Such uses should be specifically limited and be temporary in nature. i.e., no permanent structures.

The resort developed a trail system and provided the Sunapee-Ragged-Kearsage Greenway Coalition with the trail easement to provide permanent access over the property.

The updated master plan includes a Natural Resource Management Strategy with five goals to develop the property in a manner to protect its environmental resources using best management practices.

### 5. Impact on Regional Economy

Does the development propose the creation of business or industry that would significantly impact regional economic development?

According to the NHES Community Fact Sheet, Ragged Mountain has 20 full time employees. The resort should provide the number of additional employees that will be needed with the development of the condominium hotel, expansion of lodges and other resort amenities. With the significant increase in the number of dwelling units, there will be an increase in the demand for goods and services by the new residents. With the nearest full-service grocery store 10 miles away in Bristol, market conditions may provide enough incentive to develop more nearby stores, bars, and restaurants to serve the needs of après skiers and new residents. With the potential increase in the number of workers on and off the resort, there may also be a need for additional housing in the area for these employees.

### 6. <u>Impact on Emergency Response</u>

Does the proposal create a significant increased demand for emergency services response (including mutual aid) from neighboring municipalities?

The Town should assess if the proposed development will significantly increase demand for emergency services response from neighboring municipalities and whether the towns have sufficient capacity to provide such services.

### 7. Impact on Regional Housing Needs

LRPC recently published a regional housing needs assessment (RHNA) in accordance with RSA 36 which projects expected total and affordable housing needs for the region and by community. According to the draft plan, Danbury is expected to add 64 total units by 2040 and 30 of these units should be affordable to meet regional affordable housing goals referred to in new state laws.

### 3. EFFECTIVE DATE/COMPLETION OF SERVICES.

-3.1 Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, and subject to the approval of the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire, if applicable, this Agreement, and all obligations of the parties hereunder, shall become effective on the date the Governor and Executive Council approve this Agreement as indicated in block 1.17, unless no such approval is required, in which case the Agreement shall become effective on the date the Agreement is signed by the State Agency as shown in block 1.13 ("Effective Date").

Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, all obligations of the State hereunder, including, without limitation, the continuance of payments hereunder, are contingent upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds affected by any state or federal legislative or executive action that reduces, eliminates or otherwise modifies the appropriation or availability of funding for this Agreement and the Scope for Services provided in EXHIBIT B, in whole or in part. In no event shall the State be liable for any payments hereunder in excess of such available appropriated funds. In the event of a reduction or termination of appropriated funds, the State shall have the right to withhold payment until such funds become available, if ever, and shall have the right to reduce or terminate the Services under this Agreement immediately upon giving the Contractor notice of such reduction or termination. The State shall not be required to transfer funds from any other account or source to the Account identified in block 1.6 in the event funds in that Account are reduced or unavailable.

6.1 In connection with the performance of the Services, the Contractor shall comply with all applicable statutes, laws, regulations, and orders of federal, state, county or municipal authorities which impose any obligation or duty upon the Contractor, including, but not limited to, civil rights and equal employment opportunity laws. In addition, if this Agreement is funded in any part by monies of the United States, the Contractor shall comply with all federal executive orders, rules, regulations and statutes, and with any rules, regulations and guidelines as the State or the United States issue to implement these regulations. The Contractor shall also comply with all applicable intellectual property laws.

6.2 During the term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall not discriminate against employees or applicants for employment because of race, color, religion, creed, age, sex, handicap, sexual orientation, or national origin and will take affirmative action to prevent such discrimination.

6.3. The Contractor agrees to permit the State or United States access to any of the Contractor's books, records and accounts for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with all rules, regulations and orders, and the covenants, terms and conditions of this Agreement.

### 7. PERSONNEL.

7.1 The Contractor shall at its own expense provide all personnel necessary to perform the Services. The Contractor warrants that all personnel engaged in the Services shall be qualified to perform the Services, and shall be properly licensed and otherwise authorized to do so under all applicable laws.

7.2 Unless otherwise authorized in writing, during the term of this Agreement, and for a period of six (6) months after the Completion Date in block 1.7, the Contractor shall not hire, and shall not perinit any subcontractor or other person, firm or corporation with whom it is engaged in a combined effort to perform the Services to hire, any person who is a State employee or official, who is materially involved in the procurement, administration or performance of this Agreement. This provision shall survive termination of this Agreement.

- 8.2.4 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default, treat the Agreement as breached, terminate the Agreement and pursue any of its remedies at law or in equity, or both.
- 8.3. No failure by the State to enforce any provisions hereof after any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of its rights with regard to that Event of Default, or any subsequent Event of Default. No express failure to enforce any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of the right of the State to enforce each and all of the provisions hereof upon any further or other Event of Default on the part of the Contractor.

### 9. TERMINATION.

- 9.1 Notwithstanding paragraph 8, the State may, at its sole discretion, terminate the Agreement for any reason, in whole or in part, by thirty (30) days written notice to the Contractor that the State is exercising its option to terminate the Agreement.
- 9.2 In the event of an early termination of this Agreement for any reason other than the completion of the Services, the Contractor shall, at the State's discretion, deliver to the Contracting Officer, not later than fifteen (15) days after the date of termination, a report ("Termination Report") describing in detail all Services performed, and the contract price earned, to and including the date of termination. The form, subject matter, content, and number of copies of the Termination Report shall be identical to those of any Final Report described in the attached EXHIBIT B. In addition, at the State's discretion, the Contractor shall, within 15 days of notice of early termination, develop and submit to the State a Transition Plan for services under the Agreement.

### 10. DATA/ACCESS/CONFIDENTIALITY/PRESERVATION.

10.1 As used in this Agreement, the word "data" shall mean all information and things developed or obtained during the performance of, or acquired or developed by reason of, this Agreement, including, but not limited to, all studies, reports, files, formulae, surveys, maps, charts, sound recordings, video

recordings, pictorial reproductions, drawings, analyses, graphic representations, computer programs, computer printouts, notes, letters, memoranda, papers, and documents, all whether finished or unfinished.

10.2 All data and any property which has been received from the State or purchased with funds provided for that purpose under this Agreement, shall be the property of the State, and shall be returned to the State upon demand or upon termination of this Agreement for any reason.

10.3 Confidentiality of data shall be governed by N.H. RSA chapter 91-A or other existing law. Disclosure of data requires prior written approval of the State.

11. CONTRACTOR'S RELATION TO THE STATE. In the performance of this Agreement the Contractor is in all respects an independent contractor, and is neither an agent nor an employee of the State. Neither the Contractor nor any of its officers, employees, agents or members shall have authority to bind the State or receive any benefits, workers' compensation or other emoluments provided by the State to its employees.

### 12. ASSIGNMENT/DELEGATION/SUBCONTRACTS.

- 12.1 The Contractor shall not assign, or otherwise transfer any interest in this Agreement without the prior written notice, which shall be provided to the State at least fifteen (15) days prior to the assignment, and a written consent of the State. For purposes of this paragraph, a Change of Control shall constitute assignment. "Change of Control" means (a) merger, consolidation, or a transaction or series of related transactions in which a third party, together with its affiliates, becomes the direct or indirect owner of fifty percent (50%) or more of the voting shares or similar equity interests, or combined voting power of the Contractor, or (b) the sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the Contractor.
- 12.2 None of the Services shall be subcontracted by the Contractor without prior written notice and consent of the State. The State is entitled to copies of all subcontracts and assignment agreements and shall not be bound by any provisions contained in a subcontract or an assignment agreement to which it is not a party.
- 13. INDEMNIFICATION. Unless otherwise exempted by law, the Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the State, its officers and employees, from and against any and all claims, liabilities and costs for any personal injury or property damages, patent or copyright infringement, or other claims asserted against the State, its officers or employees, which arise out of (or which may be claimed to arise out of) the acts or omission of the Contractor, or subcontractors, including but not limited to the negligence, reckless or intentional conduct. The State shall not be liable for any costs incurred by the Contractor arising under this paragraph 13. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to constitute a waiver of the sovereign immunity of the State, which immunity is hereby reserved to the State. This covenant in paragraph 13 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

- 19. CONFLICTING TERMS. In the event of a conflict between the terms of this P-37 form (as modified in EXHIBIT A) and/or attachments and amendment thereof, the terms of the P-37 (as modified in EXHIBIT A) shall control.
- 20. THIRD PARTIES. The parties hereto do not intend to benefit any third parties and this Agreement shall not be construed to confer any such benefit.
- 21. HEADINGS. The headings throughout the Agreement are for reference purposes only, and the words contained therein shall in no way be held to explain, modify, amplify or aid in the interpretation, construction or meaning of the provisions of this Agreement.
- 22. SPECIAL PROVISIONS. Additional or modifying provisions set forth in the attached EXHIBIT A are incorporated herein by reference.
- 23. SEVERABILITY. In the event any of the provisions of this Agreement are held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be contrary to any state or federal law, the remaining provisions of this Agreement will remain in full force and effect.
- 24. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement, which may be executed in a number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, constitutes the entire agreement and understanding between the parties, and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings with respect to the subject matter hereof.


#### Study: 90k housing units needed by 2040

### NH Housing asssessment says state simply does not have enough housing to meet ongoing demand

Over the next 17 years, New Hampshire will need to build 90,000 units of housing, according to a study released this month.

That includes the state's current housing shortage of more than 23,500 units needed today to stabilize the housing supply.



The state's housing crisis comes as the median home price rose 50 percent from 2019 to 2022, making middle and higher-middle-class renters less likely to become homeowners.

With the state's extremely low vacancy rate — 0.5 percent statewide – the rental market favors high-income tenants pushing rents out of range for others, especially lower-income renters.

Compounding the problem are rent and home price increases outpacing wage growth.

Between 2000 and 2020, New Hampshire's home sales prices rose 111 percent, and rents increased 94 percent, while household median income increased only 73 percent.

That is some of the data contained in the 2023 New Hampshire Statewide Housing Needs Assessment prepared by Root Policy Research for New Hampshire Housing.

The bottom line is New Hampshire just does not have enough housing to meet demand, which is why both the prices of houses and rents keep increasing.

The assessment found that between 2020 and 2030, 60,000 more units of housing are needed; another 90,000 are needed between 2030 and 2040. Those totals don't account for seasonal residences and second homes; that's another 13,800 to 23,300 units by 2040.

While household incomes rose by 25 percent between 2010 and 2020, that was partly due to wealthier people relocating to New Hampshire.

Those of working age are also increasingly likely to rent rather than own, a trend that is related to the rising costs of houses which, in turn, is caused partly by insufficient supply.


There are many challenges as well for those who rent, particularly if their income is low. With an overall vacancy rate of .5 percent, it means that if 10 percent of the state's lower-income renters wanted to move – about 7,400 renters – there would be about 350 units available for them to choose without overpaying. These renters would have about a 5 percent chance of finding an affordable, vacant unit.

Apartments in New Hampshire generally rent for between \$1,000 and \$2,000 a month. At the same time, many lower-cost apartments are occupied by higher-income renters who "rent down" because higher-end rental units and homes to buy are in short supply. Landlords are more likely to rent to those with a higher income, further limiting the options for someone earning less.

Currently, there are 23,000 tenants in the state paying a higher rent than the amount affordable for their income level.

#### Drop in homeownership

The study also said a small proportion of the state's rental housing stock has a contract with or is managed by an entity that ensures the apartment is affordable for someone with a low income. Among rental housing with U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development funding, the average tenant income is under \$18,000.



According to the study, "Public resources have historically been inadequate to meet needs," according to the assessment. Housing Choice Vouchers, formerly known as Section 8, address the affordability gap. However, the study said vouchers are less effective in tight rental markets, when property owners can raise rents above subsidy levels, or simply choose not to rent to vouchers holders. Unlike all of the other New England states, New Hampshire does not have a law prohibiting discrimination based on source of income," according to the study.


Because homes in New Hampshire are so expensive, more people are staying put in apartments. The statewide median price of a home sold in the first three quarters of 2022 was \$430,000, up from \$285,975 in 2019. In just three years, the median price rose by 50 percent.

At the same time, homeownership dropped among working-age adults, particularly those ages 25 to 44. Across income ranges, the biggest decline was households with incomes of \$75,000 to \$100,000, falling from 84 percent to 75 percent. The state's homeownership rate overall decreased from 73 percent to 71 percent between 2010 and 2020.

Also, according to the study, middle to higher-income households are less likely to become homeowners.

For renters with incomes of 61 to 100 percent of area median income looking to buy — about 3,700 renters – they would have about 550 units from which to choose without overpaying. "They would have about a 15 percent chance of finding an affordable home to purchase," according to the assessment.

To stabilize the state's housing market and restore it to functional vacancy rates – 5 percent for rental units and 2 percent for ownership units — 10,905 additional rental units and 12,764 ownership units are needed. In other words, the study says, "A total of 23,670 housing units are needed today. This is New Hampshire's current housing shortage."

To accomplish the goal of 90,000 units, the state needs to increase building permits by 36 percent statewide. (From 2017 to 2021, about 4,000 building permits were issued per year.) "The only plausible way that this could be achieved is through a combination of local and state action," the study says.

The study listed a number of ways the state can meet its housing needs:

- 1. Incentivizing higher-density development
- 2. Increasing use of funding program for preservation and health improvement to older housing stock in established town centers and neighborhoods
- 3. Supporting inclusionary zoning requirement in communities with stronger markets for new housing construction
- 4. Supporting expanded manufactured housing development and conversion of manufactured home parks to cooperative ownership to maintain their availability as an affordable housing option
- 5. Supporting local land use allowances for smaller house, particularly those with co-op ownership models, to provide more efficient use of land and infrastructure
- 6. Allowing development of housing without special zoning permits such as duplexes, as well as increased allowances for "missing middle" housing types such as cottage courts, triplex/quadplexes, and mixed-use development
- 7. Increasing opportunity for detached accessory dwelling units, including the removal of permitting barriers
- 8. Encouraging conversion of commercial and office reals estate and properties to residential use through streamlined permitting and tax incentives.

## Implementing New Hampshire's Regional Housing Needs Assessment

ew Hampshire's nine Regional Planning Commissions (RPCs) have each recently completed a Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) working in concert with one another. While the RHNA's are now complete, each of the RPC's are transitioning to an implementation phase to continue the conversation, help communities plan for housing needs, and establish strategies and next steps to help address affordability.

#### **Key Findings**

A quarter of the existing housing inventory in the 34-town Southwest Region Planning Commission (SWRPC) Region was constructed prior to the 1940s, which represents a much older housing stock when compared to that of New Hampshire (19.3%) and of the United States (11.9%). Pre-1940 housing in the SWRPC Region are disproportionately rental units as well (31.7%). Older housing units are generally more expensive to live in, especially with respect to wintertime heating costs. However, many of these homes, especially single-family structures, are valued for their historical and rural character. A comparatively older housing stock will result in a disproportionate need to renovate or replace existing units or to make them more energy efficient compared to other parts of New Hampshire or the United States.

Between 2010 and 2020, vacant units for rent and vacant units for sale declined by 36.3%, dropping from an estimated 1,052 units to 671 units in the SWRPC Region. In New Hampshire, vacant units for rent and vacant units for sale declined at a slightly slower rate (34.2%) from 15,370 units to 10,110 units. While the share of available vacant housing units decreased, there was a 21.3% increase in the number of housing units for seasonal, recreational, or occasional use in the SWRPC Region (706 units). The increased use of housing for seasonal purposes is significantly higher than the State as a whole, which increased 13.6% (8,393 units). The increasing share of seasonal housing units coupled with a decreasing

number of vacant units available for rent or for sale adds to the challenge of meeting workforce and other year-round resident housing needs.

In the Nashua Regional Planning Commission (NRPC) area, the demand for housing has far outstripped supply over the past several years resulting in significant increases in housing costs for both owners and renters. Indeed, the lack of available housing, especially rental units, is challenging the ability of many people to find housing at all. Similar trends can be found throughout the state. According to the New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority (NHHFA), the vacancy rate for all rental units in the Nashua area dropped from an already low 2.8% in 2011 (5% is considered to be a healthy vacancy rate) to .3% in 2022. The vacancy rate for studio apartments and for 3 and 4-bedroom units is effectively 0%. The home buying market is also suffering from a very low inventory of homes available for sale. The Multiple Listing Service (MLS) Housing Inventory indicates the average number of months to absorb current properties listed for sale dropped from over nine months in 2011 to less than one month by 2023. Generally, a sixmonth supply is considered to be a healthy market.

Given the lack of overall inventory, it is not surprising that housing costs have escalated sharply in recent years. The median purchase price for owner-occupied homes in the region increased from \$216,000 in 2012 to \$435,000 in 2022, an increase of 101%. That said, 48% of all homes on the market and almost 80% of condominiums are considered to be affordable to home ownership households earning 100% of the median income. With the sales price of new homes approaching \$500,000, however, only 10% are affordable to median income home ownership households. Increasing the supply of affordable homes for sale, therefore, will be challenging.

On the rental side, the combined impacts of soaring prices and low inventory are much more signifi-

cant. Between 2013 and 2022, median monthly rents for all unit types in the region increased from \$1,169 to \$1,904 with two-bedroom units averaging \$1,980. The cost of a one-bedroom unit, however, rose at a much sharper rate. Rents for one-bedroom units now average \$1,863 per month and the average cost for a studio unit is \$1,525. Based on most recent available estimates, only 35.2% of all units and 15.6% of two-bedroom are considered to be at or below the affordability threshold of \$1,650 per month. As a result of the lack of affordable units, 48.1% of all renter households in the region are now considered to be "cost burdened" meaning that they spend 30% or more of their income on housing costs. For the rental housing market to return to a healthy balance, a significant increase in the availability of rental housing units will be required.

#### Outreach and Engagement

Outreach and engagement were a core-component of the RHNAs and continues to be during the implementation phase. In the North Country Council (NCC) Planning Region, continued and deeper engagement will also be an essential part of implementing the recommendations presented within it. Cooperation and increased understanding of housing conditions and needs at the municipal level will lead to new programs, policies, and permitting changes needed to increase housing choices and affordability for residents. In our work NCC strives to increase knowledge of the unique housing conditions in each community and spur local action.

NCC has developed community specific factsheets for each municipality in the region. These factsheets can be used by towns to establish a baseline

of facts about who lives in a community, what housing exists today, what is needed today and in the future, and what resources and infrastructure exist as tools.

NCC is also working with communities that are tackling housing needs through Planning and Zoning regulatory changes as part of the InvestNH HOP Grant Program administered by PlanNH and New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority (NHHFA). The data, fair share housing projections, and tools within the RHNA are packaged up and shared with each community and their project consultants to ensure that the actions cities and towns take today align with our regional understanding of the challenges and future needs forecasted within the Fair Share analysis.

NCC is reaching beyond our typical

municipal stakeholders to distribute RHNA data and recommendations to employer groups looking to drive local solutions. By widening our reach to include these stakeholders, communities can find new housing advocates for local and regional efforts.

The Rockingham Planning Commission (RPC) Regional Housing Needs Assessment is being used as a guidance document to further regional and local conversations on housing. All too often the fallout from the Regional Housing Need Assessment is hyper focused on the "fair share" number for each community. Focusing solely on "fair share" numbers at the community level distracts from the opportunity to work collaboratively and leverage shared resources that could have real impact on housing availability. If communities collectively consider where water, sewer, and transportation infrastructure co-occur, sound planning decisions can be made to move the needle on the housing challenges we face as a region. With that in mind, the theme of the Rockingham Planning Commission outreach efforts is housing is more than just a number.

To advance the housing conversation at the local level, the RPC is:

- Hosting a series of municipal officials' forums to discuss the factors that influence housing via presentations on housing development from a developer perspective, the capacity of water and wastewater availability, impacts from natural hazards, and the suitability of available land.
- Integrating discussion on housing into all our community planning work including talking about housing in the context of water resources protection, infrastructure

- availability and investment, coastal climate hazards, and the transportation network.
- Highlighting areas where water, sewer, and transportation infrastructure co-occur and support opportunity to increase housing options.
- RPC staff is providing overview presentations of the RHNA to many of our member communities that are working on master plans, regulation audits, or ordinance work through the InvestNH Housing Opportunity Program (HOP) grants.

The goal of the Rockingham Planning Commission RHNA outreach effort is to reach consensus on a regional housing approach that looks beyond municipal boundaries and supports housing development consistent with wise use and careful stewardship of the region's natural and man-made resources.

#### Meeting Regional Needs

Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) has completed its regional housing needs assessment and has met with its commissioners several times to discuss implementation of the projected fair share housing allocations by community. Recent court decisions, state legislation, and the creation of the housing appeals board (HAB) intended to address the housing crisis have clarified the obligation towns have when it comes to affordable housing. It is clear, for instance, that some communities will want to change their regulations to allow for greater housing density. For this reason, LRPC will focus its implementation activity on helping towns 1) identifying areas of the community where sewer and water could assist with development goals and 2) identifying areas of the community that should be protected from higher density development.

The Fair Share Analysis for the

CNHRPC region has identified a target of an additional 8,215 units through 2040 in our twenty-community region. To assist our communities in meeting the region's future housing needs, CNHRPC staff will utilize the NH Housing Toolbox, which was a key product of the Regional Housing Needs Assessment process developed in coordination with the NH Office of Planning and Development and a consulting team lead by Outwith Studio.

The toolbox offers a sampling of twenty tools available to communities in the State that can be used to increase housing production. These tools are essentially planning and zoning strategies that range from specific actions, such as the adoption of incentives, to more generalized approaches, such as the encouragement of mixed-use developments and improvements to existing cluster development ordinances. The toolbox can be downloaded at https://www.nhhousingtoolbox.org.

#### Strategies and Next Steps

One strategy, proposed by the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission (UVLSRPC), is the creation of a Homeowner Developer Utility (Utility). A Homeowner Developer Utility (Utility) would seek to address a number of housing barriers by making housing production more attainable, especially to moderate- and low-income households. Assistance may include design and permitting, financing, construction management, legal aid, and/or rental management. This solution was supported in the UVLSRPC's RHNA, and as part of the Keys to the Valley initiative, a bi-state effort.

To further this Utility concept, UVL-SRPC, and partners, are taking responsibility. This means advancing a utility program. The program includes components to provide immediate assistance for home creation and planning for long term organizational sustain-

ability. The goal is to plan the planners out. The first stage will be a Home Creators Expo to occur on May 6<sup>th</sup> in Hartford, Vermont. Any municipality might benefit from a Homeowner Developer Utility, no matter their regulations.

Another strategy, proposed by the Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC), is the use of scenario modeling tools to visualize the effects of housing, land use, and zoning policies. SRPC ran an analysis of buildable land to determine the amount and locations of land in the region that could be buildable for residential purposes. This analysis began by mapping all of the zoning districts in the region that allow any kind of residential use, and then "subtracted" all land

containing water, wetlands, conservation land, steep slopes, and already developed lands. The result was a GIS data layer showing all of the land in the region where new residences could be built given the current zoning regulations and existing environmental constraints. This data was also quantified to show the number of acres in each of the region's municipalities that could be developed.

Housing needs projections from SRPC's RHNA determined that the region as a whole will need 9,520 new housing units by 2040. The City of Somersworth will need 748 new housing units and the Town of Barrington will need 559 housing units in the same time frame. In the coming months, SRPC will be working on new projects

utilizing scenario modeling tools and the RHNA's developable land data to show where these new housing units in the City of Somersworth and Town of Barrington could be located. One of the results from these new projects will be GIS maps and data that display a variety of options for types and locations of new housing units in these two municipalities. These scenario modeling tools have great power when used in combination with policy making. We will be able to make better policies if we understand up front and can visualize what the effects and impacts of the policies will be on the landscape of the community.

For some, it may seem like there's nothing to be done, the housing crisis is too big and the lift seems altogether

too heavy. It's true, the housing crisis is challenging and many of the variables are out of our control. Still, there are many process and regulatory improvements communities can make, and like most challenges, tackling one aspect at a time can lead to housing solutions. Please consider the following concepts proposed by the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC):

- Begin with community goals in mind: Start with an update of your community master plan as it is the foundation of all planning efforts. Through this public process, the community's vision and housing goals are identified. Next, as community needs change, zoning and land use regulations need to mirror the changing needs. Assess zoning and land use regulations to identify roadblocks. Set up metrics to track needed regulations changes and corresponding master plan goals. Finally, set up a schedule to evaluate proposed changes and make modifications.
- 2. Allow for flexibility within the regulations: Zoning, site and subdivision regulations are typically rigid and work under the premise of one size fits all, whereas development proposals are all unique. Flexibility within zoning can be established through a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) process that can include specific criteria. Flexibility is also critical in supporting repurposing of existing buildings or creating infill projects.
- 3. Support community businesses: Vibrant communities support

- vibrant businesses, and vibrant businesses create vibrant communities. NH businesses have shared that the lack of housing supply has become a prohibiting factor to attract, retain, and even afford staffing. What can be done? Allow businesses to build housing for staff on the same site as their businesses.
- 4. Consider community needs: People of all ages have shared their stories about wanting smaller, low-maintenance, and affordable housing. Listen to those in your own community: young working couples, parents with kids, transient/visiting workers, larger families, recent retirees, and older adults needing assistance. Ask them, "what is your ideal type of housing?" and create allowances for it.
  - DIY and Housing: New Hampshire understands the do it yourself mentality. An integral part of meeting our housing needs is for current homeowners to adapt their home to their needs, which in some cases means an allowance to create additional units. This housing niche is filled with a variety of housing types, such as smaller, accessory dwelling units (ADUs); conversions of older and larger single-family homes to multiple units without changing the footprint; allowing tiny homes and tiny home harbors (existing properties that can be the parent lot to a tiny home). These types of allowances offer potential to both rural and urban homeowners as a means to age in place, in the comfort of their community.
- 6. Density is not a four-letter word: Whether it's one additional unit,

- 20, or 100, density can be a sticking point. Consider a scientific approach to density by the quality of soils and availability of groundwater. The science, balanced with community vision and housing need, would result in additional housing and perhaps more diversity in housing types. For example, soils suitable to support duplexes on the same lot size as single-family homes, would double the density without much additional cost in building or infrastructure.
- Communicate the type of growth wanted: We all have opinions, and when it comes to growth and development, developers often are open to input from the community. One simple tool to help guide developers is to create a visual guide. Local land use boards, such as the planning board or historic district commission, can develop a visual guide by researching and finding examples of buildings and building details that they feel fits in with their community character. By incorporating public input, the visual guide can become a useful tool to assure the community that new development will take into account their recommendations.

#### I. <u>Highlighted Issues</u>

- INVESTING IN OUR CHILD CARE PROVIDERS. After months of advocating for direct investment in our child care system, I am pleased to announce that the Executive Council approved \$3,600,000 to provide one-time grants to child care providers to strengthen the workforce that delivers that care for New Hampshire parents and their children. Childcare is the one of the biggest issues that New Hampshire businesses owners have told me is the barrier to hiring and retaining a strong workforce. By investing the nearly \$30 million secured by our congressional delegation for child care into our child care system, New Hampshire will see benefits in every part of the economy.
- COMMUNITY CENTER INVESTMENT PROGRAM APPLICATIONS OPEN. In October 2022, the Executive Council approved the acceptance and expenditure of \$20 million in federal funds to support the New Hampshire Community Center Investment Program. The application period for this program is now open and the deadline to submit a final application is this Friday, April 21, 2023 by 4:00PM. This program will provide resources to build and improve community spaces across the state. Eligible applicants include New Hampshire nonprofits and municipalities. In addition to meeting all eligibility requirements, all applicants will be subject to programmatic and financial review. Awards will be made to community center projects that demonstrate specific requirements. All are encouraged to apply. - **SUPERIOR COURT NOMINATION.** Anne Edwards Parker of Milford was nominated by the governor to be a Justice of the New Hampshire Superior Court. #### Gilmanton dump open with only 1 employee; 3 others fired

GILMANTON — Residents in this town will continue to be able to dispose of their household trash at the town transfer station, but won't be able to dump their recycling, yard or construction waste their until further notice.

The change in transfer station services follows an unscheduled closing of the transfer station on Wednesday afternoon.

Town Administrator Heather Carpenter said the closure on Wednesday afternoon was due to what she called a "personnel matter."

"Three employees have been separated, which is creating a staff shortage," Carpenter said. She clarified that there were four employees who operated the town's transfer station, and that by "separated," she meant that three of them saw their positions terminated on Wednesday afternoon.

Carpenter declined to answer questions about who among the four were fired, or why. The transfer station will likely continue to be open during its normal hours,

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"We are going to be open Saturday and Sunday this week, Wednesday also looks good," Carpenter said. "We will only be open for trash only, no demo, no recycling, no brush."

Carpenter said it is "unknown" how long residents will have to wait until they can continue bringing materials other than household trash to the transfer station.

She said more would be forthcoming as early as Friday.

"There will continued information tomorrow," she said on Thursday afternoon. "I can't give you the details, but I can tell you the details will be coming out eventually."
